### PSC ENTERS INTO MOU WITH UNISA

Wednesday, 19 August 2015 was a historic day for both the PSC and Unisa as these institutions signed a MoU. The MoU will provide a framework for collaboration on selected areas of research, monitoring, evaluation and development of the public administration. Furthermore, it will be facilitated by the School of Governance. The signing was led by Advocate Richard Sizani, Deputy Chairperson of the PSC and Professor Mandla Makhanya, Vice Chancellor and Principal of UNISA.

The MoU will be implemented through the following focus areas:

- a) Joint public lecture and seminars
- b) Joint research and knowledge generation
- c) Customised and targeted capacity building for PSC researchers
- d) Customised courses for specialised areas
- e) Secondments, sabbaticals for UNISA students and academics to the PSC, internships and vice versa
- f) Collaboration with Association of African Public Service Commissions (AAPSComs). This body is even looking for its Headquarters in South Africa.

In addressing the attendees, Professor Makhanya said "our partnership with the PSC is well-aligned to UNISA'S strategy which is to enter into meaningful collaborations that are action-driven and supported by dedicated resources. Advocate Sizani also shared the same sentiments and said:

"our partnership is based on the principle that UNISA is a comprehensive, open distance learning institution that produces excellent scholarship and research, UNISA fosters active community engagement, guided by the principles of lifelong learning, student centeredness, innovation and creativity".

Advocate Sizani further mentioned that:

"the PSC has a central role to play in shaping the kind of public administration and public service that will help South Africa achieve its developmental goals. In fulfilling its Constitutional mandate, the PSC will continuously strengthen ties with strategic partners to generate quality information that contribute towards good governance in the Public Service".

The event was a resounding success.

### ACTING DG HOSTS TEAM PSC MANAGERS IN A WORKSHOP

On 28 August 2015, the Acting Director-General (DG) of the Office of the PSC, Dr Dovhani Mamphiswana hosted a workshop on the 8 Principles Plan of Action for Promoting Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality within the Public Service. The workshop which was a resounding success was attended by members of the Senior Management Service (SMS) and Middle Management Service (MMS).

In his opening address, Dr Mamphiswana, mentioned that the 8 Principle Plan of Action For Promoting Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality within the Public Service Workplace, was launched in 2007 and it is aimed at "encouraging government departments to integrate 8 principles plan of action in their department's action plan to ensure that departments achieve progress towards Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality in the workplace".

The Acting DG mentioned the following as some of the notable achievements of the Task Team on Gender Equality:

- Sexual harassment policy was approved and a workshop conducted
- Women employees continues to serve and chair various committees in the organisation
- Most of the female employees received certificates in various categories during the Long Service and Special Awards held in March 2014.

In spite of these achievements, the Acting DG was concerned that some of the issues raised at the previous workshop which was held on 26 August 2014 had not been addressed. These include amongst others, the establishment of a Gender Focal Point to deal with gender matters. He also concerned that matters relating to gender mainstreaming are limited to the month of August. He subsequently urged everyone at the workshop to ensure that gender mainstreaming matters integrated into all the work conducted by the PSC.

In recommitting the PSC's commitment to the empowerment of women, the Acting DG mentioned that as from April last year to 01 August 2015, a total of 7 female employees were promoted internally whilst 20 female employees were appointed or transferred from other departments. The women who were promoted internally were promoted to the following levels:

- Level 5 one employee
- Level 6 one employee
- Level 7 one employee
- Level 12 one employee
- Level 13 two employees
- Level 14 one employee

Ms Adeline Tsienyane, Bongi Dlamini and Mmapeu De Jenga presented progress reports on the respective 8 principles of Action for Promoting Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality in the Public Service Workplace. Their progress reports were well received.

September is Heart Awareness Month -an entire month dedicated to raising awareness about cardiovascular disease in South Africa, culminating with World Heart Day on 29 September. Together with the World Heart Federation, the Heart and Stroke Foundation SA aim to spread the word that at least 80% of these premature deaths (before the age of 60) can be prevented with a healthy balanced diet, being physically active regularly and avoiding smoking.

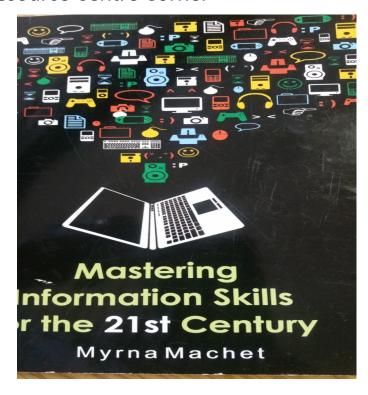
South Africa has one of the highest rates of high blood pressure worldwide, with 1 in 3 people currently living with high blood pressure. Yet almost half of the people affected don't even know they have high blood pressure! So, for Heart Awareness Month 2015, South Africans are encouraged to "Beat the pressure and get tested". High blood pressure is one of the leading causes for heart attacks and stroke so everyone is encouraged to go for a free blood pressure test this September to find out if they are at risk. Along with getting their blood pressure tested, South Africans are also encouraged to lower their salt intake, as a high salt diet is a key driver for high blood pressure.

Abstract:

This book highlights how Information Communication Technology (ICT) has changed the way we access and use information. The information environment constantly changes and it requires particular skills to make use of the bewildering flood of information literacy skills, including the ability to locate, evaluate, and use information effectively. They are important for everyone, but especially for undergraduate student.

Mastering Information Skills for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century examines the various aspects of information literacy, including locating relevant information in a range of sources and resources, such as a library and the internet; and differentiating between various types of resources such as journals, grey literature, government publications, data bases and the internet.

It demonstrates how to search electronic information obtained from internet. It also clarifies what is ethical use of information sources effectively, and evaluates information obtained from the internet.
