

PSC Mpumalanga Intervenes in issuing of ID





The Magagula family's complaint was lodged by a family member who met the PSC Officials during an inspection at Tonga Home Affairs where the challenge with the ID applications started in 2017. "Ms Nokuphila Magagula passed her Grade 12 in 2018 and she had applied to study at the University of Free State, unfortunately her dream could not be realized due to her not having an ID", said the Provincial Director, Ms Salome Meso. "The Mpumalanga Team investigated and ultimately escalated the matter to the Minister of Home Affairs, Dr Aron Motsoaledi, who ensured that the matter gets resolved".



When presented with the smart ID card, Nompilo indicated said "I now feels like a real South African and I still want to study because I'm the only girl at home and really want to help my parents especially my mom". In a heartfelt letter, the family indicated that the PSC officials respected and carried out BathoPele to its true meaning by ensuring that their daughter gets assistance with her application.

"The PSC will continue to engage relevant stakeholders in assisting the family and other citizens that may be affected by similar challenges relating to service delivery in various Departments. The PSC will also host a workshop on the Constitutional Values and Principles, BathoPele Principles and the Code of Conduct for the Tonga DHA", concluded Ms Meso.
